This searchable database from the American Medical Association provides basic professional information on all licensed physicians in the United States and its possessions.

#### American Dental Association

This site provides information on a variety of topics relating to oral health care as well as help finding a dentist in the United States.

Drugs.com offers detailed drug information. There is an index that can be searched by drug name or condition, as well as a pill identifier, a drug interaction checker, and a section on newly approved medications. A veterinary drug database is also included.

## Family Doctor

The American Academy of Family Physicians provides clearly written information that can be searched by keyword, condition or symptom. Drug information, self-care advice, and a dictionary are also available on the web site.

## Healthfinder

The "Services and Information" section provides links to information on physicians, dentists, hospitals, health fraud, Medicare, nursing homes, and more. Most information is available in Spanish.

## Household Products Database
